Why Be a CNL?



- ready to further your education, including through Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP) and Doctor of Philosophy programs and postmaster's certificates; the rigor, pace,

and content of coursework in the CNL program will prepare you well for doctoral study.

From CNL to DNP

If you wish to pursue a DNP at UMSON, there's no need to repeat coursework you've already completed for your master's degree. You can save up to 12 credits over the traditional entry-into-practice path to the

DNP, as the core courses in the CNL program meet course requirements in UMSON's DNP program. Your personalized plan of study will be determined at the time of admission to that program.

Earn Your Master of Science in Nursing in Only Two Years.

This intensive master's option is typically completed in two years of full-time study. Flexible plans of study are also available. The program requires:

- 16 courses and 65 credit hours of classroom and laboratory instruction
- more than 800 clinical hours.

Admission Requirements

Before you begin the admissions process, you can submit copies of your unofficial transcript(s) for review, and an admissions counselor will advise you on the requirements you need for admission.

The ideal applicant will have:

- a baccalaureate degree (or higher) in a major other than nursing
- an overall undergraduate cumulative GPA of 3.0 (on a 4.0 scale)
- a science prerequisite GPA of 3.0 (chemistry, anatomy and physiology I and II, and microbiology)

All applicants are required to submit the following:

- online application and application fee
- official transcripts from every institution you've attended

- an essay
- a resume or CV
- one letter of recommendation
- a completed Prerequisite Course List

You may also need to submit:

- official Test of English as a
 Foreign Language (TOEFL) or
 International English Language
 Testing System (IELTS) scores
 taken within two years of
 application (for international
 applicants and applicants without
 a degree from a U.S. secondary
 or post-secondary institution)
- a residency classification if you're applying for in-state (Maryland) status.

The Guaranteed Admission Pathway (GAP)

UMSON offers guaranteed admission to the CNL program on a space-available basis to students at partner four-year institutions who complete their bachelor's degree and the seven CNL prerequisite courses. In addition to the standard admission requirements, GAP requirements include successful completion of 45 undergraduate credits at the partner institution and a cumulative partner institution GPA of 3.0 or higher. Students interested in the GAP should meet with their advisor at the partner institution as soon as possible after completing 45 credits.

Simulation Labs and Clinical Placements

During your experiences in our advanced clinical simulation labs, through our Standardized Patient Program, and in clinical rotations, you'll experience real-world situations under close faculty supervision. You'll:

- build your competencies and confidence, clinical and communication skills, and decision-making abilities
- get a feel for various clinical settings and practice environments
- have an opportunity to learn without the potential for compromising patient safety
- experience rare and critical events you may not see during your nursing education but could experience in your career.

These simulated experiences are critical to your development as a confident, skilled nurse and to improving patient outcomes.

Clinical Simulation Labs

Approximately **10%** of your prelicensure clinical hours take place in our simulation labs. Our **20** labs in Baltimore replicate realistic hospital, operating room, neonatal and pediatric (with the world's most advanced infant robot), maternity, home care, and health assessment settings.

Standardized Patient Program

Working with standardized patients, who are actors trained to portray patients, in spaces made to look like real health care environments, you'll practice taking patient histories, performing assessments, and having difficult conversations, like end-of-life discussions and breaking bad news, for example.

Clinical Placements
